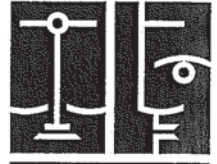


Victorian Law Reform Commission

Submission: Surveillance in Public Places



The Victorian Law Reform Commission is encouraging discussion about the many ways that surveillance is conducted in public places. We have released a Consultation Paper on Surveillance in Public Places and are seeking your feedback on how surveillance should be regulated in Victoria.

We have come up with a number of proposed options for reform of the law. These include a new regulator to monitor, report and educate about public place surveillance; development of guidelines (that may be voluntary or may attract fines if breached); licenses for some users of surveillance; and a way for people to complain to the courts about serious breaches of their privacy.
